- Data Collection: Interviews, FGD with Executive Committee Members of Consortium, Haritha Karma Sena Members, Verification of Records, Field visit & Structured Questionnaire for data collection.

Objective

To understand the Structure, Process and Outcomes of Rural Solid Waste Management System in Kerala

Formation of Haritha Karma Sena

- Based on Government order GO No. 10394 –
 D 2017 dated 23.04.2018.
- Haritha Karma Sena started functioning in 'Best Performing GPs' in 2019
- Haritha Karma Sena started functioning in 'Least Performing GPs' in 2021 & 2022

Availability of Mini MCF

- GP1 One per ward
- GP2 Two per ward
- GP3 only one in active wards
- GP 4 only one in active wards
- The quality of the Mini MCFs are below average.
- It is Overloaded.
- There is no proper cover for protecting from rain
- Surroundings of the Mini MCFs developed as a dumping yard

Mini MCF and Surroundings



Status and Facilities Available in MCF

- Size of the MCF is small. Storage capacity is not sufficient. It is overloaded
- Old buildings or surroundings are converted as MCF
- There is no segregation facility
- There is no toilet facilities, water supply, resting place
 & hand washing facility
- Other facilities such as Baling Machine and Weighing Machines
- The overall environment is not conducive as a workplace for segregation

Material Collection Facilities (MCF)



Protective Gear and Equipment for available for HKS

- No proper gloves(surgical gloves are issued but no use)
- No proper shoes (Heavy shoes are difficult to wear and carry. Demands for canvas shoes)
- Demands for safely glasses, ear plugs, hard hat, respirators, coveralls, rain coat & mask
- It is felt that gloves and heavy shoes suited to women are not available in the market.

Status of Haritha Karma Sena

- There is a two member team in every ward of best performing GPs
- However there is a shortage of 3 to five members at GP level
- Least performing GPs 2 to 7 wards only covered

Social Status of Haritha Karma Sena

- ➤ Relatively better social status when compared to traditional rag pickers. This is because of the involvement of Local Governments and *Kudumbashree* and Government Tag
- ➤ Stigma has reduced at considerable level still it is there in different forms.
- ➤ Organized and became members of Trade Unions

Economic Status of HKS

- ➤ Rs.10000 to Rs.28000 per month in 'Best Performing GPs'
- ➤ Rs.1000 to Rs.6000 per month in 'Least Performing GPs'
- Considerable amount is available with Consortium
- ➤ Consortium amount varies from Rs. 4 lakhs to 9 Lakhs & around 50 % of amount is utilized for loan among the members
- No micro enterprises have been started in any of the GPs

Discussion and Conclusion

- Kerala has succeeded to develop a structure, institutions and systems for solid waste management.
 Sustainability?
- However, it is not functioning as the expected level
- Citizen education is needed
- Innovations are needed at all levels starting from door to door collections to Clean Kerala Company (CKC).
- It gives an impression that CKC is not functioning as it is expected. (In the last two to six months, the CKC is not in a position to deliver the service to LSGs)
- Training & Capacity is needed to all the key actors
